1 BY MR. MOON:

- 2 We like to welcome everybody to the Restoration Advisory Board meeting
- 3 here at 6:30. One of the things I wanted to do before we start in the new
- 4 business was to make a clarification for the record to clarify a comment made
- 5 in accordance to the June 9th, 2011, meeting over the past 16 years there have
- 6 been 50 meetings, and including the June Advisory Board meeting we just had.
- 7 I just wanted to clarify that in a statement that was made in the last June
- 8 meeting and it was brought to my attention.
- Now we'll go into new business. First thing on the agenda here is the
- 10 discussion of bylaws.
- 11 Everybody's got, it looks like, it looks like this with some corrections.
- 12 There are some things that have been put on here for you to look at.
- 13 Everybody's got one. This is basically for us to discuss as far as the members
- of the Advisory or Restoration Advisory Board, so.
- 15 BY MR. BOONE:
- So at the last meeting we all discussed potential changes to the bylaws,
- 17 and it was agreed that Paul would make recommendations --- Mr. Savko would
- 18 make recommendations about changes, and we would have a subcommittee agree
- on what we present to the board for your approval or disapproval, as the case
- 20 may be.
- So what we have in front of you is those recommended changes, and we're
- 22 kind of open to suggestions about how we can go through them and agree or
- 23 disagree.
- 24 BY MR. HERZOG:
- 25 I have a question.

1 BY MR. BOONE: 2 Yes. 3 BY MR HERZOG: 4 Does the board or the Corps approve any changes to the bylaws? 5 BY MR. BOONE: 6 Well, actually the board does. BY MR. HERZOG: 7 Trying to make it A or B. Actually, I read them, and I don't have any 8 9 problem with any of that stuff. BY MR. BOONE: 10 11 On the last page ---BY MR. HERZOG: 12 I don't have any problem with it. 13 14 BY MR. BOONE: 15 On the last page of the bylaws in your package, Section VII there is a paragraph about changes and how they're made, and in true bureaucratic 16 fashion we suggested changes for that, as well, as to how we're actually doing 17 18 this. So, you know, I've said, I've made this statement before, but this is really 19 your board and how you guys run it. We're here to facilitate. We're here to 20 21 help you be part of the community and educate you about our project here, and so this is your document, and the Corps doesn't want to be dictating any, any 22 changes or procedures to you. I kind of encourage you to decide amongst 23 24 yourselves how you want to do this and what format it takes.

- The original objective was that there were three bylaws and the three
- 7 bylaws did not necessarily agree. There were conflicts between the three of
- 8 them, so we tried to straighten that out. The committee was ---
- 9 BY MS. MCKINNEY:
- 10 Suzy. Suzy McKinney.
- 11 BY MR. SAVKO:
- 12 And Shawn, so we kind of gotten together, and hopefully we can iron out
- 13 some of the things, but do take them home. Take a look at them, read through
- 14 it, and be prepared the next board meeting to either accept or reject what's
- 15 there, and, again, if it takes a rewrite, we'll need to do that.
- 16 BY MS. MCKINNEY:
- And for clarification what you do have in front of you are the original
- 18 bylaws, the introduction to bylaws and the roles and responsibilities of the RAB,
- 19 and either in red or blue text, however it printed out, are the recommended
- 20 changes Mr. Savko presented based upon his reviews. As he indicated at the
- 21 last meeting, he would take lead on looking at the bylaws and recommending
- 22 improvements. So those are the recommendations. You can see where they are
- 23 within context, and, of course, you've got the originals in your notebooks, as
- 24 well.
- 25 BY MR. GIBSON:

Does this go back to the earlier one, because we --- it was changed some. 1 2 BY MS. MCKINNEY: 3 This is based on the most current bylaws ---4 BY MR SAVKO: Since the latest revision. 5 BY MS. MCKINNEY: 6 7 --- from 2010. BY MR. GIBSON: 8 9 It was changed like six or eight years ago when I was on the board. BY MS. MCKINNEY: 10 Let's see, 2009, I believe. So these are the --- they're based on the 11 12 most current operating bylaws. 13 BY MR. MCMILLAN: I have one comment. Hugh McMillan. 14 Based on the frequency of our meetings, if we stick to this 20-day deal, 15 which I think we have to, but if we wait until the next meeting to propose any 16 differences, we'll have a new board sitting here by the time we get around to 17 improving them. 18 19 I would suggest that we, the board have an interim meeting to discuss this, so we can vote on a final approval by our next meeting with the Corps of 20 Engineers. If we're going to have to drag them up here again for that, I don't 21 think it would be necessary, but I just --- you know, if we'll wait until next time 22 to discuss any changes, and then, "Okay," we pencil in that, and then we're going 23 to review that again the next time, well, that puts us right about the time that 24

members of the board get turned over again, doesn't it?

1 Twenty-two months, at least. On the agenda is the remedial investigation feasibility study update, and 2 3 that's by the Corps of Engineers. BY MR. BOONE: 4 We have a draft final version of the work plan for the remedial 5 investigation, and just for everyone's reminder it goes draft version, draft 6 7 final, and then final. Typically the draft version is an internal document of the Corps of 8 Engineers, and the draft final is distributed to a limited number of 9 stakeholders for their comment and to include DHEC, and we posted it on the 10 11 website for you all to view in the interim. So we posted it there so that you would be aware of it for one thing, and, 12 two, to have the opportunity to maybe comment on it or make suggestions about 13 changes, that sort of thing that we can take under advisement. 14 So if you had an opportunity to look at it, then we'll be willing to listen 15 here or at any time in the near future, if anybody has anything. 16 So, remind me, Spencer, what the schedule is for the final. 17 18 BY MR. O'NEAL: We hope to have it finalized within the next few weeks, and we'll get that 19 20 out to everyone. 21 I want to take a moment to introduce you to the technical manager of the project, Ms. Teresa Carpenter. She is the one that understands all that mumbo 22 23 jumbo stuff. So this is Teresa. She's been on the project now two ---24

BY MS. CARPENTER:

1 (Inaudible.) 2 BY MR. O'NEAL: 3 --- or three years, and I wanted to, just in case there were any technical 4 discussions, I had to bring her, but, you know, we I just wanted to make sure 5 she was introduced to you. 6 We're looking at the next few weeks trying to get it finalized in order to 7 make that. Okay. 8 Then we move on from there and we're taking a look at trying to get 9 rights of entries, which the board, the board can help us with those rights of 10 entries, and we will be most thankful, because we need to get rights of entries 11 in order to get on the property in order to do the investigational studies. 12 BY MR. GIBSON: 13 Do you put out a list of places you need to go that we may need to help 14 you with? 15 BY MR. O'NEAL: 16 No. BY MR. GIBSON: 17 18 Well, then how we will know what we may able to do there? 19 BY MR. O'NEAL: 20 I'm looking at Shawn. 21 BY MR. BOONE: 22 The typical process is that we get a list of properties right off of the 23 county records, the land ownership records. Then we do a mass mailing to 24 everybody with a cover letter explaining that we need this legal document 25 signed by them in order to come on their property and sample or a survey.

Where we run into trouble is often people disregard the notice, or they 1 2 just don't want us on their property. So there may be a time where we need some local people who can talk to them and convince them, you know, this isn't 3 the government coming and being obtrusive or intrusive. It's just us, you know, 4 5 wanting to make sure that everyone is safe and that we have the best 6 information that we can gather. So, we may be coming up down the road in a couple of months that we 7 8 need you to do some public education sort of thing. 9 BY MR. HERZOG: Is that just for a preliminary look at some of this property? Don't you 10 11 have a right of entry in the name of public safety? 12 BY MR. BOONE: 13 The Corps the Engineers does not. DHEC does. 14 BY MR. HERZOG: 15 I'd just say where I work. BY LIEUTENANT DYAS: 16 Lieutenant Dyas with the Spartanburg County Sheriff's Office. 17 18 When you do your mass mailing, then we'll get a list of everybody who has given permission, then you'll have another list of people that have not given 19 20 permission. Will that list go out to RAB members here so that they might know 21 these people so they can go to their house and say, "Hey, did you get this 22 letter? This is what this is about and this is how they plan on doing that"? 23 BY MR. BOONE: 24 Usually we make a visit before we try to get public support, but it 25 depends. That is a viable option, yes.

BY LIEUTENANT DYAS:

- Well, if you give to the board and community that list and all, there's
- 3 some people that live in this area that haven't responded back, not necessarily
- 4 that they're saying they don't want you to come on the property, but they just
- 5 haven't responded back to you and is there a reason they haven't, have they
- 6 moved out of town or whatever.
- 7 BY MR. BOONE:
- 8 Right.

- 9 BY LIEUTENANT DYAS:
- That we can maybe stop by and say, "This is what, you know, this is what
- 11 we're trying to do," a little bit education just trying to get cooperation for the
- 12 government to go in there and maybe that kind of speed up the process a little
- 13 bit and get you in there in a timely manner.
- 14 BY MR. BOONE:
- Definitely. It could definitely work that way, but it's hard to speculate
- 16 exactly how that list is going to look after the first round. Some places all of
- 17 them come back or nearly all of them. A little phone call from one of us gets
- 18 them to go ahead and sign and send in the letter. Other places we get nearly
- 19 none and end up walking door to door literally. So we'll have to wait and see
- 20 what the best approach is, and then it may be a whole team of us that we would
- 21 go out and knock on doors.
- 22 BY MR. HAYES:
- 23 Shawn, will there only be one mailing or will there be a second mailing
- 24 after the first mailing to who doesn't respond?
- 25 BY MR. BOONE:

- There will be an initial mailing, and then, based on the level of response,
- 2 there may be a second, but it's very time consuming to go door to door and
- 3 speak to everyone, and so if nobody responds and we have 2,000 places we need
- 4 signatures, then there will definitely be a second mailing.
- 5 BY MR. HAYES:
- 6 Well, what kind of information will be included in the mailing?
- 7 BY MR. BOONE:
- 8 It comes with a cover letter explaining why we want it, what we're doing,
- 9 and that sort of thing; and then with the document, the actual right of entry,
- 10 which has some legal mumbo jumbo on it and describes, you know, the
- 11 government is allowed to come on your property for this type of action.
- 12 BY MR. HAYES:
- For a number of one year, two years or would there be a time limit?
- 14 BY MR. BOONE:
- 15 Yes, there's a time limit. It's one. Depending on the type of surveying
- 16 we're doing, it's either one or two years.
- 17 BY MR. HAYES:
- 18 Well, on the certain pieces of property, you know, some of the surveys
- 19 will be so much width and others are going to be wider, will it say the extent of
- 20 the surveying on the property for the landowner?
- 21 BY MR. BOONE:
- No, but you need a right of entry for the entire parcel regardless, even if
- 23 we just cross a corner of it.
- 24 BY MS. CARPENTER:
- 25 This is Teresa Carpenter.

One of the reasons that we have to do the rights of entry in a specific way is because when we get to the end, if people refused to let us go onto their property, we can still move forward without their permission. We can't go on their property, but we can close that property out.

So the District has to follow specific procedures, though there will be another mailing in the event that we don't get enough for the remedial, but we do have to follow a specific procedure in order to close it out, even if we don't have enough rights of entries, otherwise we keep doing this process over and over again and not get anywhere, so we're still trying to figure out how that process works. I don't know that we --- we are supposed to close it out or have gotten to the end of the process yet, but it is a paper trail as well, so, but hopefully, you know, that won't be an issue.

13 BY MR. BOONE:

What Teresa is speaking of is a term called potential responsible party. As it stands now, the Corps of Engineers is taking full responsibility for any contamination that exists from the DOD's actions on these properties. If somebody denies us the right or the ability to go on property, look for the contamination and remove it, then they become potentially liable for any contamination that's there.

- 20 BY MR. HERZOG:
- 21 Shame on them.
- 22 BY MR. BOONE:
- So there has to be a --- we have to document the process that we underwent through in order to get there prior towards investigation.
- 25 BY MR. HAYES:

- Okay. What's the distance of time until they block out people who don't
- 2 give right? Do you have an end date which you have to have everything done?
- 3 BY MR. BOONE:
- 4 You know, the funny thing about all this is that this is an option for us to
- 5 push the liability onto others, but to my knowledge we have never done it.
- 6 BY MS. CARPENTER:
- 7 Yes.
- 8 BY MR BOONE:
- Where the only cases where we have done it, we've actually settled with
- 10 the landowner and paid them to do their own removal, and then they took
- 11 responsibility for the contamination; but in no case where they denied access,
- 12 so we just said, "That's it. You bought it."
- 13 Susan.
- 14 BY MS. BYRD:
- 15 DHEC has done that, and we have state and federal regulations that we
- 16 follow. In other words, if the golf course property owner decides they're not
- 17 going to allow any access, well, then we can require them to clean up under the
- 18 same regulations that the Corps is going to clean up.
- So I hope we don't have to use that, but it can be beneficial in explaining
- 20 to the people when we go door to door for any signatures. "If you don't allow
- 21 the Corps to clean it up, then the Department DHEC can require you to clean it
- 22 up," but hopefully we won't have to go that route.
- 23 BY MR. HAYES:
- Is what you stated in the right of entry form?
- 25 BY MR. BOONE:

1 I just read it last week. 2 BY MS. BYRD: 3 No. 4 BY MR. BOONE: 5 I don't think that it says that initially, no. 6 BY MR. HAYES: Would that be in the landowner's rights that they should know their 7 rights before you ask the right of entry? 8 9 BY MR. BOONE: 10 Well, it does say in the last sentence of the first paragraph that we are looking for a voluntary signature. We want everybody who signs to do so 11 12 voluntarily. 13 We don't start off with a threatening statement. 14 BY LIEUTENANT DYAS: You could just say, could you --- you're stating that you're trying to force 15 16 these people with threats, and that's not --- I don't believe you would want that. BY MS. BYRD: 17 18 But it does take the law, CERCLA law that it does discuss the responsible party, and, you know, how you become responsible if you don't follow this 19 20 particular regulation. So that is clearly documented. It's just written in 21 legalese that's difficult to follow. 22 BY MR. HAYES: 23 Well, I think he was saying before that we would have a public meeting. 24 Wouldn't it be good to have a public meeting before a mailing goes out? 25 BY MR. BOONE:

     probably get Channel 7 to go along and make an announcement. If somebody

     doesn't take the paper, they might be watching the news; but, you know, I think

     to have a question and answer at a public meeting would make the mailing a little
     more cost effective as to who replies to the mailing. You know, if somebody

     can't come, they might send a friend or family or somebody to the meeting for

            And, typically, we do the meeting after the mailing, and we don't have a

     lot of these types of projects in the state. I mean, to be honest, I've only ever

     done or gotten this far with a project one other time, and that's my own

     personal experience.

     BY MR. HAYES:

If we do the mailing before the public meeting, why don't we set a date 1 2 for the public meeting and announce the public meeting in the mailing so they ---3 you know, so it can then include it in the paper and then in news, so that would 4 be three times they'd have a chance to know about it, because that would be a 5 waste of mailing and not announce the meeting in the mailing, because we have a 6 lot of people out of state or something like that ---7 BY MR. BOONE: 8 True 9 BY MR. HAYES: 10 --- that aren't familiar with what's going on. 11 BY MR. O'NEAL: 12 When we've done similar where we gave them 30 days, we did the mailing, "Thirty days there will be a public meeting," and I mean they came out in groves, 13 14 because they wanted to know what we were coming out to do. It was effective. 15 When they came in, we gave a presentation to everybody, and we did an evening 16 session. For those people who had not signed rights of entry yet at that 17 particular time we had at one station. We, you know, had someone there 18 explaining to them what it was all about prior to and after our presentation, if 19 they didn't understand, and it did work out great that way. 20 So I mean we're open to do whichever way you guys think will be most effective. I only bring that up to you because this is a portion of our objective 21 22 where it's no longer on the Corps. It's based on public participation of how 23 much property that we get so we can investigate for the remedial. So, you know, word of mouth helps a lot, and you guys reach a lot more 24 25 people than we could ever reach on location wherever you are. We could on the

- 1 phone 24/7 and still not get as many people as you guys come across in church,
- 2 at the store or whatever. So that's the only reason I bring that up, too.
- 3 BY MR. HAYES:
- 4 I think the public meeting will be the place to talk about the liability to
- 5 pass along, which if somebody raises a question, it could be addressed then, so
- 6 it won't be like a threat from the Corps to the public. They would be just
- 7 answering questions, and I'm sure you can find somebody that will ask it.
- 8 BY MR. O'NEAL:
- 9 I agree with you a hundred percent.
- 10 BY MR. MCMILLAN:
- 11 Problem with having the public meeting first is we'll have people that will
- 12 hear about it but presuppose that it doesn't apply to them. Then the public
- meeting is gone, and they get the mailing, well, they don't have anybody to do
- 14 answering the questions.
- 15 So in my opinion it's more --- it seems more effective to do the mailing
- and get individuals that this does impact's attention, and they'll be more inclined
- 17 to keep their ears open and participate in the public meeting, and that's just my
- 18 opinion.
- 19 BY MR. O'NEAL:
- 20 And the other location where they're having to answer a whole bunch of
- 21 calls is the mayor's office, and also the local police department where they're
- 22 trying to figure out, "Hey, what is this? The government is coming. What's
- 23 going on?" They call with this huge list they were provided what was going on so
- 24 they could continue to send the message. That's just another suggestion and
- 25 one of the ways we can do it.

- In fact, I think the last time I said where all the people congregate, you
- 2 know, churches, grocery stores, soccer ball fields and those type of places. A
- 3 lot of people may ---
- 4 BY MR. HAYES:
- 5 Also, in the mailing you might have a card in there where they RSVP or
- 6 something for the meeting, that way we'll know about how many people are
- 7 coming so we'll have the right size facility for the meeting.
- 8 BY MR. BOONE:
- 9 As Spencer alluded to, though, there is usually a presentation that goes
- 10 along with the meeting so everybody gets a sense of what the scale of effort is
- 11 and what we're going to do. So it's difficult to set a meeting date prior to the
- 12 finish of the work plan, but once this work plan gets finalized, then we'll be able
- 13 to move on to, you know, who exactly we'll be targeting for rights of entry, and
- 14 also have a better handle on when we should have the meeting and where
- 15 everybody gets included and we have our ducks in a row.
- 16 BY MR. HAYES:
- 17 Is the mailing list in hand?
- 18 BY MR. BOONE:
- I don't have a copy of it here, but, yes, we have a mailing list.
- 20 BY MR. HAYES:
- 21 Do you know about how many that is on the list?
- 22 BY MR. BOONE:
- Thousands.
- 24 BY MR. SHIFLET:
- 25 It's around 2,000.

1 BY MR. BOONE: 2 Two thousand. 3 BY MR. SAVKO: Gary, you've got about half a dozen good ideas there. One, I don't know if 4 people consider this for a motion, but I like the idea of establishing a date and 5 then putting the date in the newsletter or the letter that you're going to mail. 6 So that's going to be a very effective way of communicating. One, we got a 7 8 date, put it in the mail, and we're going to have a public meeting. Those three things happening is going to be a very good successful way of communicating, 9 10 and I think you're going to have a turnout people wise. I understand the date or setting the date is going to be down the street, 11 12 but once you set the date, and you're going to do the mailing and in the mailing 13 you're going to have the date of the date, and then you'll have the public meeting to talk about all of the signatures and liability and no liability, 14 15 permission and no permission, and that type of thing. I think that's a very good 16 idea. I really do. BY MR. BOONE: 17 18 I do, too. 19 BY MR. GIBSON: 20 Okay. Who gets the placement for things to happen? 21 BY MR. BOONE: 22 That would be me. 23 BY MR. GIBSON:

You got it, Shawn? Okay. That's set then.

24

25

BY MR. SAVKO:

It will be a matter of record because it's in the minutes. 1 2 BY MR. BOONE: 3 Okay. 4 BY MR. HAYES: Do you have to have all this down, all the rights of entry by a certain 5 6 date, by the first of the year or by Thanksgiving or ---BY MR. BOONE: 7 We have to have a right of entry in order to start the sampling of all the 8 grid work. Whether we have them all or not, no, that's not necessary, but being 9 that the bulk of the linear mileage of the samplings on Croft State Park, we'll 10 be going after John for his first, and, you know, we'll pick up the others as we 11 12 can. We'll do the initial mailing all at once, but we'll be talking to John on a 13 daily basis until he gets his back; and then we'll be doing a second mailing, 14 15 knocking on doors, whatever it takes to try and get as many as we can. 6	respond.			
7	We did upgrade our cantonment vessel. We had a real big update. All of			
8	our electronics and all that has been redone, so our capabilities are enhanced			
9	even better now.			
10	So, like I said, if you need us, we're there, and when we do respond, we			
11	try to get the GPS coordinates on that, and we give it to Shawn and get you all			
12	that, and this year there hasn't been too much at all.
