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1 BY MR. TOBIAS: 2 We'll call the meeting to order. I'm Jimmy Tobias and the co-chair, and 3 we look like we have a quorum here, so I think we'll --- glad that we have a 4 pretty good crowd here today. I think the first order of business will be old business, and we'll let the 5 6 Corps of Engineers bring us up to date on the GPS project. 7 BY MS. CANTOR-MCKINNEY: 8 I'm Suzy McKinney with Zapata. We're contractors to the Corps of Engineers. During our last meeting, the Forestry Commission asked for some 9 10 GIS data and some GIS base maps of the park and of the former camp for overlays on their trails and for fire fighting purposes and planning and training, 11 12 and just to provide an update to the group, that we did provide them those GIS 13 files and the data, and hopefully that that was helpful. 14 So I just wanted to give the status on that update. 15 Okay. 16 BY MR. TOBIAS: 17 Okay. Is that it on old business? 18 (NO RESPONSE) 19 BY MR. TOBIAS: 20 And then we have Lieutenant Dyas from the Spartanburg County 21 Sheriff's Office, I believe. 22 BY AGENT RENNA: 23 He's not here tonight. 24 BY MR. TOBIAS:

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He's not?

1 BY AGENT RENNA: 2 No. 3 BY MR. TOBIAS: 4 What about Ted? 5 BY AGENT RENNA: Ted is not here, but I can speak for them. Rick Renna. 6 7 BY MR. TOBIAS: Rick, you doing all right? 8 9 BY AGENT RENNA: 10 Yeah, I'm coming along. The responses for the Sheriff's Office, the last responses were at down 11 12 off of Henningston Road at the fire they had there where several 2.36 inch 13 Bazooka rounds were found. They were disposed of onsite. 14 We're still on call for the Forestry Department if they have to call us. 15 They called us out to that. We have --- they haven't had any other calls out 16 there since then. 17 They've given a couple of classes to the Forestry on munitions out there since then. That's about all. 18 BY MR. TOBIAS: 19 20 We're glad you're here and wish you the best. 21 I guess we'll go with the project update. 22 BY MR. BOONE: 23 All right. I'd just like to introduce myself first. I'm Shawn Boone. I'm 24 with the Corps of Engineers, and for those of you who don't know, we administer the Department of Defense's program to clean up these old defense sites. So 25

- 1 we're the vehicle for the funding, and we contract with Zapata to do the actual
- 2 work, and Michael is going to tell us a little bit about where the project is.
- 3 BY MR. WINNINGHAM:
- 4 Apparently, we're not going to use that.
- 5 BY MS. CANTOR-MCKINNEY:
- 6 They're not pulling up? Okay.
- 7 BY MR. WINNINGHAM:
- 8 No. No.
- If you all remember back in January, February, March, we did some vegetation removal and came in and did the digital geophysical mapping of OU11C and the remaining grids in OOU3, which is up in Wedgewood.
- All the DGM has been completed in these two areas. We are in a process right now on finalizing and categorizing the targeted anomalies out there. Some of these anomalies that exceed does not necessarily mean that it's a MEC item.
- 15 It could be soda pop cans. It could be little pieces of frag. It could be underground utilities. It could be just about anything. Excuse me.
- So what we're doing right now working with Brendan is categorizing, prioritizing these anomalies. So we come up with a number of anomalies we need
- 19 to investigate for the next round, which would be the intrusive portion of
- 20 OU11C and OU3. We hope to have that done here by the end of this month,
- 21 finalized, so we can figure out many picks we've got; and, once again, depending
- 22 --- you know, based on the golf course and this area here, it will most likely be
- winter work, again, January, February, March timeframe.
- 24 Are there any questions?
- 25 BY MR. HAYES:

1	So you're going to both of them in January and February?
2	BY MR. WINNINGHAM:
3	It all depends. It depends on, you know, the golf course we can only do
4	January and February.
5	This one here, if we get it set it up, it may be earlier. It may be after
6	the golf course. It just depends on when it falls out.
7	You know that's sort of a wishy washy answer. I just don't have the
8	answer right now.
9	BY MR. HAYES:
10	What's the timeframe for both of them?
11	BY MR. WINNINGHAM:
12	FY '09 is the timeframe, so which is October 1st through September 30th
13	somewhere in there, we start investigating these anomalies.
14	Any additional questions?
15	BY MR. HAYES:
16	What's the cost of cleaning up each one of those?
17	BY MR. WINNINGHAM:
18	Once again, it all depends upon how many of the targets that are
19	prioritized that we investigate. There's a cost per each anomaly. I don't know
20	what that is off the top of my head.
21	So, but once we finalize the number of targets, come up with that pick,
22	then we'll come up with a number for the Corps of Engineers out of Huntsville,
23	and then we'll provide them that number, and they'll come in and mod, and mod
24	our scopes [inaudible] and start doing some intrusive.
25	BY MR. BOONE:

1 Brendan. 2 BY MR. SLATER: 3 Brendan Slater, I'm with the Corps of Engineers in Huntsville. I don't ---4 may be a more direct answer to your question would be is we have not 5 negotiated the price of that work yet. 6 We can throw out some numbers, estimates, breakdown, things like that, 7 but once the --- what Mike is calling the pick list, it's basically the list of what 8 anomalies are going to be dug, which ones were picked. 9 Once that is accepted, we'll then have a number, and then we'll go ahead 10 and negotiate with Zapata; but as of right now, that number has not been fixed. 11 There has not been a negotiated price. 12 So Mike is not trying to get out of giving you the answer. 13 BY MR. HAYES: 14 Yes. 15 BY MR. SLATER: 16 He doesn't actually have an answer to give you, because it hasn't been 17 determined. 18 BY MR. HAYES: 19 So this is not work to be bidded out? 20 BY MR. SLATER: 21 No, it's a --- it's a negotiated mod to Zapata's contract. 22 BY MR. WINNINGHAM: 23 Any other questions? 24 (NO RESPONSE) 25

BY MR. WINNINGHAM:

1 And if you think of any other ones, I'm sitting right over there, and you

2 can just call, and I can get right back up here, so thank you.

3 BY MR. BOONE:

4 Thank you, Michael.

5 BY MR. TOBIAS:

I guess the next order of business will be the 2009 Restoration Advisory

7 Board membership.

BY MS. CANTOR-MCKINNEY:

Well, as everyone is aware, the term of the current RAB is expiring. We announced the opportunity to complete applications to be considered for the next RAB, which will serve a one or two year term, depending upon the length of the next task order for Zapata for this. We've got one more year funding, so at least one more year of a RAB, hopefully more.

We received 12 applications. As you know and per the By-Laws, we have nine vacancies or nine positions. Also per the By-Laws, we have identified a selection panel of three individuals who will review those applications and make recommendations to the Corps of Engineers. It will go up to the Commander of the Corps in Charleston for the ultimate approval and acceptance of the next RAB.

The three individuals for the selection panel were identified based upon their demonstrated interest in this project by either participating on Restoration Advisory Boards in the past or are no longer interested in serving on future boards, as well as individuals who have demonstrated their interest by attending meetings over the last many years. We've been meeting now for over 12 years.

1 So those three individuals will review the applications. They will make their recommendations that will then be forwarded ultimately to the 2 3 Commander of the Corps for selection. 4 We will notify those individuals who are selected, and we'll have a 5 transition at our next meeting, December, January timeframe to the new board. So that's the status of the application process. 6 7 I want to thank everyone who has submitted and thank those individuals 8 who have agreed to help us with that evaluation. 9 BY MR. TOBIAS: 10 Okay. I believe at this time I'll open it up to the public, if they have any questions to address to me or the Corps or Zapata at this time. 11 12 (NO RESPONSE) 13 BY MR. BOONE: 14 I think that's a first. 15 BY MR. TOBIAS: 16 No questions? 17 Robin? 18 BY MR. ZIMMERMAN: 19 Yes, I do have one without ---20 BY MR. TOBIAS: 21 All right. 22 BY MR. ZIMMERMAN: All right. The current US military status in the Mideast and so forth, we 23 talked about this before. Financially, how is that going to impact this, you know, 24

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the long term basis of it?

But I mean what I mean will it dig into funds? Because I've been reading in the Wall Street Journal and Financial Times that --- I'm not trying to be whiz kid or anything, but that, you know, various Corps of Engineers projects around the country. In fact they got an article last week in the Financial Times about that, that the various Corps of Engineer cleanup projects from old World War II bases would be cut into.

BY MR. BOONE:

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- 8 Okay. It is a good question.
- The money for the Formerly Used Defense Site Program is allocated by the Congress, and, of course, like you said, it's competing with a lot of other priorities.
 - For FY '09, which starts next month, we got roughly the same amount of money nationwide to allocate to projects. So the South Atlantic Division, where South Carolina lies, got about the same amount of money; and the good news is that, although we started out with 28 million --- over 20 million dollars allocated for FY '08, we were plus-ed up, as it were, to 38 million. So we actually spent almost double on projects within the South Atlantic Division.
 - So we're starting off where we were at the beginning of last year for next year, but we anticipate actually getting more; and, of course, sometimes on some projects schedules slip, and we have responsive contractors, like Zapata, who can act quickly, and so money sometimes comes from other projects to things like Camp Croft.

23 BY MR. ZIMMERMAN:

- Thank you.
- 25 BY MR. BOONE:

1 You're welcome. 2 BY MR. TOBIAS: 3 Well, are there any questions from anyone on the Board to Zapata? 4 BY MR. SHOOLBRED: 5 Yeah, I have one. I brought it up last time. We were talking about the 6 fire lanes and stuff in the --- through the park, and I was just curious did anything the --- this GIS project information, is that GPS coordinates that you 7 8 provided to the Park Service; and do they now --- do you guys now have 9 handheld GPSs that you can navigate with or do you just know it well enough to be able to get through there; and the fire departments and stuff like that, do 10 they have coordinates, and do they know how to navigate in --- in the park? 11 12 BY MR. BRAMLETT: I don't. We do have GPSs. We don't have that information downloaded 13 14 to our individual handheld GPSs. 15 Basically, the information we were looking for was their historical 16 information loaded in our CADS, what we call Computer Aided Dispatch System. The main reason for that was if we get a fire, not only in the park but going in 17 18 the Camp Croft area, when it pops up on the dispatch center screen, it's going 19 to prompt them to say, "Okay. This is in the old Camp Croft area. We need to proceed with caution," and then we've got the thing where we've got the Bomb 20 Squad where --- where we're holding back until we get them in there and screen 21

So, in other words, to say that there's a bomb --- nobody can say that is a real hot area here and that these are GPS coordinates, I mean.

BY MR. SHOOLBRED:

ahead of us.

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2 BY MR. BRAMLETT:

Some of it is on it but a lot of it isn't. So we're basically treating the whole area as a hot point.

BY MR. SHOOLBRED:

Yeah. Well, the last time at our last meeting I think I brought up the possibility of sectioning it off into coordinates and having clean paths through that you could get to, because it's a --- it's a large area, and it --- the possibility of having a large fire in that area is --- is there; and so I don't know if there's any way that the Corps of Engineers and you guys can work together and then somehow have a priority where you can put lanes through the old base area or through the park area that you know would be clear that would allow you better access to any area that could possibly catch on fire.

14 BY MR. BRAMLETT:

15 That's a certain possibility.

The way we're looking at is now we know the horse trails. We know they've been scanned. I've been --- since the last meeting I've been out there several times.

I've been on Henningston Road from one end of the road all the way down to where it comes out on McFadden Road, which goes down to the old pool. So I checked that area out.

22 I've been on some of the horse trails.

We've had meetings with the Park Service, their Columbia office. We had that this week, and so we have a lot of things that are in, the ball is rolling. We're trying to get some things done with that.

1 So, and they understand that it is a big vast area, and that if we get a 2 fire in there, it's not going to be our traditional go out there and plow out and a 3 few extra fires. It's going to be a few extra fires. It has potential of getting 4 to be a large fire. 5 We understand that. Now the Park understand that, and I'm going to be 6 working with the fire departments, the three fire departments that have 7 jurisdiction in there: Croft, Glenn-Springs Pauline and Pacolet. 8 So, yeah, we are. We're definitely we're actively working on that. The 9 biggest thing right now is the fire, the safety of our firefighters with the Forestry Commission and the Fire Service. We want to make sure our guys are 10 safe, and I know the chiefs over there want to make sure their people are safe, 11 12 too, so it's --- it's a slow process, because we've got to figure out what things we 13 can do and can't do; and graciously the Sheriff's Department and the Bomb 14 Squad has agreed to help us out a lot with this, and they were a tremendous on 15 the fire we had on Henningston Road, and they've offered some future help with 16 that. So that it is, that's been a help. 17 So I guess to answer your question, that's definitely something that's on 18 the table. 19 BY MR. SHOOLBRED: 20 Okay. 21 BY MR. BRAMLETT: 22 We ---23 BY MR. SHOOLBRED: 24 Well, I mean personally I think that that, other than the ordnance that's 25 in habitated areas, ---

- 1 BY MR. BRAMLETT:
- 2 Right.
- 3 BY MR. SHOOLBRED:
- That's the biggest threat that we face from that area out there, and the
- 5 fact that you can't get through it to get in there to do something against the
- 6 fire to fight a fire is --- yeah, that's a pretty --- that's a serious situation.
- 7 BY MR. BRAMLETT:
- 8 And you're right. That's definitely something that we've mentioned again,
- 9 and we did have a fire on the south part of the park, the one, Jimmy, when that
- 10 car was stolen.
- 11 BY MR. TOBIAS:
- 12 Two years ago.
- 13 BY MR. BRAMLETT:
- It was about a year, year and a half or two years ago, which part of the
- 15 bike trail actually stopped a large portion of the fire. The fire burned up to it
- 16 and went out. So it's not a very fast moving fire on a lot of the horse trails and
- 17 bike trails as a whole. It's just if you get a bad day, bad wind conditions, it's
- 18 going to jump it. So we just may have to back off to another trail or another
- 19 road, and it may end up being a 15 fire end up being a 500 fire, 1000 fire. We
- 20 don't know, but we --- but I can tell you right now, we're definitely actively
- 21 trying to come up with all kind of --- this --- the way this park is, it's not going
- 22 to be one solution fits all.
- 23 BY MR. SHOOLBRED:
- 24 Yeah, the terrain is pretty prohibitive. It's kind of ---
- 25 BY MR. BRAMLETT:

1 The terrain is ---2 BY MR. SHOOLBRED: 3 It's tough. 4 BY MR. BRAMLETT: 5 We are able to do things. We did slow the fire down on Henningston Road. The Bomb Squad actually got in front of us and scanned. We came right 6 behind them with dozers and put a line in there. So, that's another option. 7 Again, on a fast moving fire, it's not going to help us a whole lot, but we are ---8 9 and we're going to continue to be. I've got to meet with the fire chiefs here. 10 In fact, I was scheduled to meet with them about two weeks ago and had to leave and go up to the mountain fire we had up there near Hogback, and we 11 12 just had to reschedule. So, we'll definitely continue to do that. 13 BY MR. SHOOLBRED: 14 Okay. Thank you. Thanks. 15 BY MR. TOBIAS: 16 Any other questions? 17 BY MR. HAYES: I saw there was something that I received that said somebody was going 18 19 to address the Johnson family, Jessie Johnson family. Wasn't that on some 20 agenda for this meeting? 21 BY MS. CANTOR-MCKINNEY: That was on a draft agenda. It's not on our final agenda. 22 23 BY MR. HAYES: 24 So it was taken off? 25 BY MS. CANTOR-MCKINNEY:

1 Yes, sir.

2 BY MR. TOBIAS:

- Any questions from the audience, or we're going to adjourn? Short
- 4 meeting.
- 5 BY MR. ZIMMERMAN:
- 6 Just one.
- 7 BY MR. TOBIAS:
- 8 All right.

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- BY MR. ZIMMERMAN:
- 10 Is it possible, feasible that sometime in the future maybe, if the State
- 11 has the funds, you could actually have your own fire department on that part or
- 12 maybe three or four pump trucks? That might sound like a waste of money, but
- 13 it would save probably a lot of ---
- 14 BY MR. BRAMLETT:
- 15 I don't know. That's --- you bring up a good point.
- One thing that we are going to be working out with the Fire Service of
- 17 Spartanburg is if we get a fire in somewhere in that old Camp Croft zone, and
- 18 this is something I've got to work out with not just those three chiefs that
- 19 have jurisdiction there but pretty much the whole county, maybe even into
- 20 Union, because parts of Jonesville and the other is going across, is that if we
- 21 get a fire in there, we're going to start getting more brush trucks, not only in
- 22 those three districts, but surrounding to be on standby. The biggest thing is
- 23 structure protection.
- 24 You know, you've got a big vast of area of woods, and if they burn, you
- 25 know, that's one thing, but our number one concern is going to be to structure.

- 1 So if a fire department is out of brush trucks, we may have to get brush trucks
- 2 from surrounding departments to come in there and be where all those
- 3 structures are around the perimeter for structure protection just to be
- 4 proactive and make sure something doesn't happen.
- We're also looking at Croft has got some new equipment. We're going to
- 6 look at foaming capability. If we can't go in there and safely plow or whatever,
- 7 we have to put in wet lines and foam, and so it gets back to kind of it's not going
- 8 to be one situation fits all. We're going to be doing more things out there.
- There may be some innovative ideas that come up that we haven't even
- 10 thought of at this point.
- 11 BY MR. ZIMMERMAN:
- 12 Thank you.
- 13 BY MR. BRAMLETT:
- 14 Uh-huh (affirmative response).
- 15 BY MR. ZIMMERMAN:
- 16 Thank you very much.
- 17 BY MR. TOBIAS:
- 18 Well, if there's not anything else, I guess we'll adjourn this meeting.
- 19 BY MR. HAYES:
- I make a motion to adjourn.
- 21 BY MR. SHOOLBRED:
- 22 I'll second it.
- 23 (MEETING ADJOURNED AT 6:45 P.M.)
